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AAPHD Executive Council Midyear Meeting

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I must admit, it is with mixed feelings that I called Candace and told her of my decision to resign as AAPHD historian, thus ending 23 years of elective or appointed office on the Executive Council. You may remember that I was secretary-treasurer just about the time the association decided to end its management contract because of financial difficulties. Luckily, I was able to persuade Helen, with the Executive Council approval, to take over the day-to-day management. That arrangement lasted for 14 years. During that time, she handled the day-to-day affairs and I, in cooperation with the secretary-treasurer, handled the financial affairs. I was pleased to know you have appointed Joe Alderman to succeed me. Joe has had a long and distinguished career in the military and dental public health. He has held all of the elective offices in the association and served in Desert Storm. He served as dental director of Georgia until his retirement this year and was very active in the American Association of State and Territorial Dental Directors during those years. We are thankful to Linda Niessen and the Foundation Board for providing the leadership to move it forward.
