Purpose

Unless oral care is included in the design and provision of . health care programs for individuals as well as communities, comprehensive health care cannot be achieved.

- 1. "Oral health means much more than healthy teeth."
- 2. "Oral health is integral to general health."

Policy statement

The American Academy of Pediatric Dentistry emphasizes the importance of prevention, diagnosis, and treatment necessary to restore and maintain the oral health of infants, children, and adolescents. Comprehensive health care cannot be achieved unless dental care is a strong priority in all health service programs.
