1998 International Special Merit Award for Outstanding Achievement in Community Dentistry: Johng-bai Kim, DDS, PhD

The AAPHD has had a long-standing interest in international health as reflected by activities of its committee on international relations, annual symposia on oral health matters outside the United States, and the rapid growth in membership from those with non-United States residence. Our members from other countries participate in annual sessions, publish in the *JPHD* and vote, yet they are not likely candidates for traditional AAPHD awards.

The purpose of this new award is to recognize international members who have contributed substantially to the improvement of oral health in countries other than the United States through research, community-based programs, or academia. The award is made possible by the generous support of the Colgate-Palmolive Co. I

also would like to give a special thanks to Alice Horowitz, whose promotion of this award and pursuit of sponsorship made it possible.

It is now my pleasure to recognize Dr. Johng-bai Kim as the 1998 recipient of AAAHD's International Special Merit Award for Outstanding Achievement in Community Dentistry. Dr. Kim is professor and chair of the Department of Preventive and Public Health Dentistry, College of Dentistry, Seoul National University. He has contributed to the improvement of the oral health of Koreans and, concomitantly, has distinguished himself in a variety of capacities, including lecturing, consulting, publishing, conducting research, and making and implementing policy. He *practices* dental public health.

Professor Kim has had a vision—to

improve the oral health of all Koreans. He has worked to ensure that all 11 dental schools in Korea have a viable department of preventive and public health dentistry and he has trained a cadre of dedicated public health dentists who now have positions in each of the dental schools throughout Korea. In addition, he has worked to upgrade the preventive dentistry curricula in dental schools and in dental hygiene programs, as well.

Under his direction, faculty members in his department have worked to implement community water fluoridation. He has sent faculty to work with the CDC in Atlanta and to take courses on community water fluoridation implementation and surveillance. He brought a very knowledgeable water engineer from the CDC to Korea to consult on implementing commu-

nity water fluoridation. He and his staff have increased the number of communities in Korea that are optimally fluoridating their water supplies from one in 1981 to 22 in 1998. Further, negotiations are in progress to fluoridate Seoul, a city of more than 12 million people. In communities where community water fluoridation is not feasible, he has introduced school-based fluoride mouthrinsing. Currently, over a million children rinse weekly in rural areas.

Through his political strategies, in collaboration with the Korean Dental Association and other agencies, an office of dental public health in Korea's Ministry of Health was established in 1997 for the first time. This new department will provide the opportunity to further increase options for improved oral health for all Koreans.

Dr. Kim received his DDS in 1962 from Seoul National University, and his PhD in preventive dentistry, also from Seoul National University. He is a member and officer of many prestigious Korean dental associations, he has published 11 textbooks related to oral health, and he is the author of 119 scientific articles spanning epidemiology, dental personnel supply, expanded functions, dental treatment needs, fluoridation, and many others.

Dr. Kim has demonstrated seminal leadership for public health dentistry in Korea. On behalf of AAPHD, it is my pleasure to present him with the association's 1998 International Special Merit Award for Outstanding Achievement in Community Dentistry.
